Our current vans are road warriors and each has over 250,000 miles. It is time to replace both. It costs \$100,000 to operate Kate Marmion Rides to Radiation annually. I was going to San Antonio and my son had to take off work so much to drive me. Thank goodness he has a good boss. When I found out I could do my treatments in Uvalde and they were going to drive me

here, it was the best news. I had no idea how I would handle this by myself. It's so hard to believe that they can do something like this. I say it every time I get picked up and I say it to everyone at the center. These people don't know how wonderful they really are. It has helped me, and my son not having to take off work, so much. I cannot thank the donors enough."



Maria Barragan, 66, from Del Rio will have 30 radiation therapy treatments for stage 2 breast cancer. Her brother, Nicolas Rodriguez,

I feel very comfortable with the drivers because they are so good and kind. Kate Marmion Rides to Radiation, a 501 (c) (3), was created after the close of the "Saving Lives Close to Home" capital campaign which raised over \$5 million to build the Kate Marmion Regional Cancer Medical Center in Uvalde. This effort brought Clear Springs Center for Cancer Care - the first and only radiation therapy practice west of San Antonio- and expanded specialty care for the residents of our region.

Patients typically receive 30 radiation treatments delivered over six-weeks. Our mission is to help alleviate financial burdens for patients associated with traveling to and from their delivered treatments in

with traveling to and from their daily treatments in our vast nine-county region.

Patients use the service if they are unable to drive themselves because of their illness, unreliable transportation, or their family members are unable to take off of work to take them to and from their treatments.
